It's a New Century for Oklahoma Masonry!

On February 10, 1909, some 1400 Masons of the State of Oklahoma, consisting of what was then known as the Indian Territory and Oklahoma Territory Grand Jurisdictions, met in convention at 2:00 p.m. at the Guthrie Scottish Rite Temple for the purpose of adopting the constitution and by-laws of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free, and Accepted Masons of the State of Oklahoma. Before the sun set on that day, the first Grand Lodge in the 46th state had elected and installed its officers.

It was a momentous day. It was the first time in the history of American Freemasonry that 3 Grand Lodges had separately and legally been established by a convention of lodges within the same geographic area. It ended an era of territorial Masonry that collectively sired 400 constituent lodges over a 35 year span.

This heritage will be a part of the theme of our upcoming Spring Reunion, appropriately named "Oklahoma A.F.&A.M.—A New Century" Reunion. Like the Guthrie Scottish Rite itself, established in Oklahoma Territory 13 years prior to Grand Lodge, the Spring Reunion scheduled for April 3-5, 2009, will actually predate the statewide celebration of Oklahoma Masonry to be observed on May 31 in Guthrie.

This gives us a chance to reflect on our own past, promote the upcoming celebration of Masonry in Oklahoma by being a part of its planning, and rejoice in the new century of Masonry which lies in front of all of us. The theme of the Guthrie Scottish Reunion will be to reflect on the best of our past, consider the needs of the present, and plan for the type of Masonry we want to experience in the future. That's the kind of speculation that should prove to be fun, thoughtful, and retrospective for all true students of Masonry in our state.

The programs and exhibits scheduled for our Scottish Rite weekend will attempt to blend the best traditions of our older generation of members with the technologically driven culture of the young men entering our fraternity in this new century. It will surprise you how many things these generations now have in common. We should be able to capitalize on this to form the Masonic experience for the next few decades.

The Reunion activities will kick off on Thursday evening with pre-registration and an introduction to the Scottish Rite for our candidates. Opening ceremonies will begin at 8 a.m. on Friday, April 3, in the main auditorium.

Major Ed Pulido to be Guest **Speaker on Saturday Night**

You won't want to miss our Saturday evening program at 7:30 p.m. on April 5th. Retired Major Ed Pulido, who lost a leg in Iraq in 2004, will tell us his personal story through a powerful powerpoint presentation while introducing us to the Folds of Honor foundation, a non-profit group he now works with that raises money to send the spouses and families of those who have fallen or been wounded in Irag or Afghanistan to college.

There is Room in the Inni

Chalk it up to misfortune, or opportunity which rises out of recessionary times, but most of the sleeping rooms in the old legislative hall will once again be available for Scottish Rite Reunions, Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter! That is, at least for a while. Those planning on staying at the Temple for the upcoming Guthrie Scottish Rite Reunion can make reservations with the Temple Innkeepers at any time.

The challenges we have faced in our efforts to use tax credits to restore the old legislative hall have been exacerbated with the present economic recession. The result is that it seems unlikely we will have the money raised during this year to begin construction of the \$12 million restoration project. This has created the necessity to determine if there was any feasible way we might make the old 1908 building at least temporarily habitable during Masonic functions.

There have been three major (and growing) problems associated with the utilization of the old brown brick building situated along the east side of the Temple property. One has been in the delivery of clear water to the hotel bathrooms and sinks. Century old pipes generate rust in the supply lines. The rust then, not only discolors the water, but also plugs up shower facilities, sinks, and toilets. The result is, with time, most of our lavatories have become un-usable. In addition, the air infiltration around the many windows in the building causes an enormous amount of heat loss during the winter, resulting in heating bills which sometime exceed \$17,000 during our coldest winter months. During recessionary times, the heating bill becomes a significant factor in whether or not we can balance each year's budget.

The easiest solution is simply to mothball the building until all of its issues can be resolved.

But the Guthrie Valley is com-

prised of a large geographic area. To make the trip to our Reunions is not like driving from one side of a metro area to the other. It is often a matter of hours. It is a great convenience when our reunion workers can stay in the building for the weekend. Everyone knows this is what gives Guthrie such an eclectic retreat environment. Faced with the permanent closure of our 1908 hall, and the possible impact this might have on our active volunteer pool, the Advisory Conference has taken a hard look at alternatives.

Fortunately, our building maintenance superintendent, Tim Heaton, has been studying these same problems over the past year. The bottom line is that our building maintenance department has figured out a way to temporarily resolve the water supply problem and reduce the cost of heating the old legislative hall until we can get the funds raised to do the total restoration which ultimately must be done to save the old building. The Advisory Conference has voted to expend funds for these recommended improvements.

Not all rooms will be available. And sinks will no longer be usable in the individual sleeping rooms. But those who love to stay in the temple will once again have clear, clean water accessible to them and a warm bed. Hey...some of our hard liners say that's better than a tent. After all, it's only for a couple of nights.

Styled the *Education on the Rite Nite*, the new program is designed to offer an indepth study of the Scottish Rite degrees; one degree and one night at a time. These monthly *Rite Nite* programs will occur on the third Wednesday and will be conducted in lodges across the Oklahoma City Metro area. A parallel program will take place each month in other lodges across the Valley.

The first meeting was held on February 18th and hosted by Siloam Lodge, with the conferral of the 6° by the Oklahoma City team. The esoteric aspects of the

degree were presented, including such things as the grips, words and signs which are not usually given when the degrees are presented at our bi-annual reunions. An added powerpoint presentation revealed some of the hidden secrets imbedded in the symbols of the degree. A good discussion followed where participants focused on contemporary applications of the degree's lessons. It was an evening of education, involvement, and good fellowship; which is one of the hallmarks of the Scottish Rite.

Masonic Charity Foundation Announces \$1 Million Gift for Alzheimer's Research

The Oklahoma Masonic Charity Foundation announced this month that it will donate \$1 million to the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation to help build and equip an Alzheimer's Disease Laboratory on the medical foundation's property in Oklahoma City. Ken House, President of the Masonic Foundation, remarked that "there's hardly a person in our state who has not had a family member, or someone they know, who has been devastated by this tragic and crippling illness. Our own fraternity has its share of members whose productive lives have been shortened because of this awful disease. We are proud to assist the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation in their cutting edge efforts to find workable treatments for this terrible malady."

The gift comes at a landmark time for the OMRF, which is currently embarking on the largest expansion of research space in the foundation's 62-year history. It recently acquired the Keys Speech and Hearing building from the University of Oklahoma. That property was situated in the middle of the medical foundation's research campus. The acquisition will enable the foundation to build an 8-story research tower which is scheduled to be ready for occupancy by 2011. The new facility will provide over 200,000 square feet of new laboratory space and facilities. Funding for the construction of the tower has already been secured.

The Masonic Foundation's grant will construct and equip one of the 8 floors of the new tower to be dedicated to Alzheimer's research. The floor will be named the "Masonic Charity Foundation Alzheimer's Disease Laboratory." The Masons' funding will not only provide scientific equipment necessary for scientists to focus their efforts on understanding the cellular processes which lead to the development of Alzheimer's, it will offer recruitment packages for attracting new scientists, salaries for technical assistants, and laboratory supplies essential to Alzheimer's research.

This is a public/private partnership of magnificent proportion. With the building of the new research tower, the Masons will be partnering with the state of Oklahoma through the state's Opportunity Fund, along with many of the largest corporate and family foundations in Oklahoma. Our collective dream is to be able to add to the already remarkable achievements being made by the Medical Research Foundation in the field of Alzheimer's research. Together, we will be aiding and attracting some of the best scientists in the country to explore new techniques for treating a disease that steals the memories-and ultimately the lives--of more than 4 million people in the United States every year.

That's a dream worth owning.

In early childhood, Rebekah suffered with spinal meningitis which caused a seizure disorder. Rebekah did not begin speaking until the age of four. Rebekah also has learning disabilities and problems with integrating and processing sensory information.

For three years, with the support of her family, Rebekah has faithfully attended language and reading therapy at the clinic. Together with the family, her clinician helped to design and implement an effective treatment program for her language and learning difficulties. Initially, Rebekah showed problems in expressive reasoning, taking another person's perspective, vocabulary, figurative language and following and participating in conversation. These are all classic signs of a language learning difficulty.

Today, Rebekah's language skills are where they should be. Through the help of the Scottish Rite, she has been able to overcome most of her language differences and has "broadened" her view of the world by making better judgments and taking part in meaningful conversations. Words/concepts no longer sound "foreign" to her. She also has become quite an avid reader! Her favorite subject: Horses.

In fact, part of Rebekah's amazing progress is due to her extraordinary love of animals, especially horses. She has learned all about them; their care, their habits and many riding techniques. Rebekah has proven herself responsible enough to own her own horse, so on Christmas morning, her family blindfolded her, placed her in the car and took her out to the riding stables where Sammy, her newest and best companion, was waiting for her. Rebekah would say that this was her best gift ever. Her parents believe too that the Scottish Rite has given Rebekah a great gift, one that will last a lifetime.

The reason for this unusual "top of the year" request was clear enough. With the loss in equity income the Valley suffered last year due to the recession, the income projections for 2009 from dues alone were not adequate to cover the expected operational costs of the Valley for the current year. The request for help was made only to our perpetual members because of the income gap that currently exists between the earnings on our perpetual membership fund and the dues currently paid by our dues paying members. This year, it is a short term matter of equity. We simply made a straight forward request to our perpetual members that they send the Guthrie Lodge of Perfection the same amount of money that all other members annually pay for dues, less what was earned last year on their endowed membership.

For 2009, this difference came to \$32. We asked the perpetual members to help fill the gap by sending the Lodge of Perfection this amount.

Of course, this gap is expected

to a degree. A gap between what regular members give in dues each year and what is earned from the perpetual endowment will always exist until all perpetual members pass to that house not made with hands. Perpetual memberships are a long term investment benefit to the Valley. In reality, during the lifetime of our perpetual members, this gap is subsidized by those who have already passed; and from the normal earnings from the reserve fund in the lodge. In good years, the individual member never notices. But this year, the gap was too large to let stand.

The Valley is proud to report that nearly 500 perpetual members stepped up to the plate this year to do their fair share to support the Guthrie Scottish Rite Temple and the Valley's important programs.
